

Wednesday, 8th March, 1882

WEDNESDAY, the EIGHTH day of the month of MARCH, in the forty fifth year of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, being the First Session of the Fifth Parliament or Legislature of the Province of Quebec, as continued by several prorogations to this day.

At three o'clock in the afternoon, His Honor the Honorable Théodore Robitaille, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Quebec, being seated in the chair on the Throne, The Honorable *Speaker* of this House commanded

the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod to proceed to the Chamber of the Legislative Assembly and acquaint that House, "It is His Honor's pleasure they attend him immediately in the Chamber of the Legislative Council."

Who being come thereto.

The Honorable *Speaker* of the Legislative Council said :

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor does not see fit to declare the cause of his summoning the present Legislature of the Province of Quebec until the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly shall have been chosen according to Law, but to-morrow, at the hour of three o'clock in the afternoon, His Honor will declare the causes of his calling this Legislature.

The Legislative Assembly then withdrew, and His Honor the Lieutenant Governor was pleased to retire.

Then, on motion of the Honorable Mr. *Dionne*, the House adjourned until to-morrow at three o'clock in the afternoon.

Thursday, the 9th March, 1882.

At three o'clock in the afternoon, His Honor the Honorable Theodore Robitaille, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Quebec, being seated in the chair on the Throne, the Honorable the *Speaker* of this House commanded the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod to proceed to the Chamber of the

Legislative Assembly and acquaint that House : “ It is His Honor’s pleasure they attend him immediately in the Chamber of the Legislative Council.”

• Who being come thereto, the Honorable *Louis Olivier Taillon* said :

“ May it please Your Honor, the Legislative Assembly have elected me to be their Speaker, though I do not feel very able to discharge the important duties assigned me. If, in the performance of those duties, I should at any time fall into error, I pray that the fault be imputed to me, and not to the Legislative Assembly, whose servant I am, and who through me the better to enable them to discharge their duty to the Queen and country, humbly claim all their undoubted rights and privileges, especially that they may have freedom of speech in their debates, access to Your Honor’s person at all seasonable times, and that their proceedings may receive from Your Honor the most favorable interpretation.”

The Honorable *Speaker* of the Legislative Council said :

“ Mr. *Speaker*,

“ I am commanded by His Honor the lieutenant-governor to declare to you that he freely confides in the duty and attachment of the Legislative Assembly to Her Majesty’s person and Government, and not doubting that their proceedings will be conducted with wisdom, temper and prudence, he grants, and upon all occasions will recognize and allow their constitutional privileges.

I am commanded also to assure you, that the Legislative Assembly shall have ready access to His Honor upon all reasonable occasions, and that their proceedings, as well as your words and actions will constantly receive from him the most favorable construction.

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor was then pleased to open the Session by a gracious speech from the Throne to both Houses.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly.

It is with the deepest regret that, in opening the Fifth Parliament of Our Legislature, I have to advert to the heinous attack upon the person of Her Majesty the Queen, which has been the occasion of as much sorrow as amazement among our people.

My first duty is to thank Providence who has preserved to the affection of Her subjects as Sovereign so beloved and respected, and whose noble qualities should have shielded Her from the criminal attempts which have, of late, so frequently been directed against heads of nations.

We take advantage of the occasion of the reopening of this Legislature to tender to our Sovereign the expression of our affection, loyalty and gratitude for the many benefits she has conferred upon this country.

The neighboring Republic has been less fortunate and, in connection with the crime which removed from this world a great citizen, the President of the United States, I must express sympathy which is all the more profound that our relations with that country are so friendly.

My Government has been actively engaged in endeavoring to secure for its own railway, the traffic of the Intercolonial and the negotiations opened with that of the Dominion will. I have every reason to believe, lead the latter to apply to the Federal Parliament for the establishment of a steam ferry service for the transfer of trains between Quebec and Levis, so as to assure us direct connection with the Intercolonial. This prospect has added to our provincial property a value of which my Government considered it should take advantage. A measure will in consequence, be submitted for your consideration and approval with a view of carrying out the dominant idea of our provincial policy, since the inauguration of our railway undertakings.

I am happy to inform you that the railway, between Quebec and Ottawa, built at a great sacrifice, as the first link in the great Pacific line, will now attain the end foreseen and desired by the country, by utilizing the geographical position of the Province to attract the immense trade of the West, and afterwards, we hope, that of the East, and thus make of our large seaports distributing centres for the traffic between Victoria, Winnipeg, Chicago and Halifax.

You will be called upon to deal immediately with the arrangements which have been entered into, in order to leave this railway and the resources which it may develop to the initiative of private enterprise, if they meet your approval.

These measures will at once relieve the Province from heavy burthens and enable it, by means of a fixed revenue, to maintain the equilibrium of its finances and permit the following up of the policy of improvement and progress, which has so often already been crowned with success.

I hope that the Legislature will, in occupying itself with this serious matter, look upon it as one of those national questions, of interest to our whole Province, which rise above ordinary political considerations.

I am happy to announce that the measures adopted by the Government for the management of the Public Domain have produced excellent results and the report to be laid before you will show a considerable increase in the revenue arising therefrom.

My Government has endeavored to develop the resources of the Province by means of foreign capital and its attendant spirit of enterprise, and this policy has had the effect of attracting hither large financial and industrial associations, whose operations cannot but beneficially influence the agricultural economy of the Province.

Business men of England and France have already favorably responded to these efforts and my Government proposes to establish closer relations with these country.

With this object in view my Government took part in the Geographical Exposition of Venice and the attention which the Province of Quebec received at the hands of scientific men and specialists from all parts of Europe, was as flattering as it will be fruitful in good results.

The mining, timber, phosphate, sugar, butter and cheese industries are now in a state of transition which has already been productive of much good and my Government proposes to give fresh impetus to this movement by means of other measures for their encouragement, tending to assure general prosperity and thus further the settlement of our wild lands.

Among these measures are the establishment of a School of mines under the direction of able professors and also of special schools of instruction in the methods of turning farm produce to the best advantage.

Reforms are required in the administration of justice. The Legislative Assembly during last session instructed the Commission for the Revision and Codification of the Statutes to prepare a scheme for the reorganization of the Courts and the remodelling of the Laws of Procedure. The report of the Commission will be submitted for your consideration with the draft of a bill which will enable you to pronounce on the merits of the suggested amendments.

The work of the Revision of the Statutes has been continued. The compilation of the laws in force in the Province is completed and will be submitted to you with the second report of the Commission.

Bills respecting public lands, the protection of settlers, the profession of Surveyor and others respecting the Department of Crown Lands will also be submitted for your consideration.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly :

The Public Accounts will be laid before you and Supplies will be asked of you for the next fiscal year. You will, I think, be satisfied with the operations of the past twelve months and still more so with those of the ensuing financial year, based upon a farseeing policy and a careful development of our resources.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council :

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly :

I thank Divine Providence for the abundant harvest and all the benefits bestowed upon us during the course of the year. I hope that your labors will be so inspired by it that your legislation will show that you are not unmindful of its solicitude.

Then, the Legislative Assembly withdrew and it pleased His Honor the Lieutenant Governor to retire.

That we admit with His Honor that reforms are required in the administration of justice, and will take into consideration the report of the Commission for the Revision and Codification of the Statutes which the Legislative Assembly last session instructed to prepare a scheme for the reorganization of the Courts and the remodelling of the Laws of Procedure, as well as the bill which will enable us to pronounce on the merits of the suggested amendments.

18. That we learn with satisfaction from His Honor that the work of the Revision of the Statutes has been continued, and that the compilation of the laws in force in the Province is completed and will be submitted to us with the second report of the Commission.

19. That we will carefully consider the Bills respecting public lands, the protection of settlers, the profession of Surveyor and others respecting the Department of Crown Lands to be submitted for our consideration.

20. That we, with His Honor, are thankful to Divine Providence for the abundant harvest and all the benefits bestowed upon us during the course of the year, and we hope that our labors will be so inspired by it that our legislation will show that we are not unmindful of its solicitude.

The first paragraph being again read.

The Honorable Mr. *Beaudry*, seconded by the Honorable Mr. *Hearn*, moved.

That the same be adopted.

The question of concurrence being put thereon, the same was unanimously.

Resolved in the affirmative.

The 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th, 11th, 12th, 13th, 14th, 15th, 16th, 17th, 18th, 19th and 20th paragraphs of the said resolutions being severally read and the question of concurrence being put on each, they were unanimously agreed to.

We were profoundly shocked, upon hearing, that an attempt had been made on Your Majesty's most honored and valuable life.

We take the earliest opportunity of adding our congratulations to those which we are persuaded will come from our fellow subjects, in all parts of your empire, at your providential escape from so grave a peril.

We are deeply grateful to the author of all good for averting a dire calamity from your Majesty's people, and thankful to him that your Majesty's life, may still be counted among the precious possessions of your devoted subjects.

We pray that the blessings of Your Majesty's Reign may long be continued.

To the Honorable the Legislative Council
of the Province of Quebec.

The Librarian of the Legislature of the Province of Quebec has the honor to submit the following report :

Since the commencement of the last session, that is since about ten months, the Library of the Legislature has been increased by 1032 works of all kinds, which brings the total number of books and pamphlets to 28,777. This is not a very great increase ; but I was compelled to take steps to make good a deficit of several hundreds of dollars, caused by the purchases and other necessary expenses of the previous years.

An annual grant of \$3,000 is not sufficient for the requirements of a Provincial Library, and I have no doubt that the amount will be increased as soon as the state of our finances will permit.

The Parliament Library as become, to a certain extent, a public one. I do not complain of it but, on the contrary, I am pleased to see a taste developed for reading and study.

Nearly one thousand persons, I think, are permitted to take books, which are, as a rule, returned faithfully and in good order.

It is true we have to regret the disappearance of some books, even important ones ; but this is an inevitable evil, for it is absolutely necessary to trust a little to people's honesty.

Amongst the works received during the past ten months, about 400 are bound. The remainder consists of pamphlets of all kinds, some of two or three pages only and others of a hundred.

The official reports of the Province are not included in this number.

Some volumes have been sent to us as gifts, and a great number as exchanges. Amongst the latter are 163 official publications of Brazil. Moreover Brazil has sent us 48 plans and maps. In return we sent a splendid collection of such Legislative documents and Canadian Literary works as we could spare.

The list of gifts to the Library is annexed to this report.

Your Committee recommends that the annual grant be raised to \$4000. The Librarian is informed that the members of the Legislature desire to have standard works similar to those in the Federal Parliament Library, and appear to think that there is negligence somewhere, if these works are not as numerous in this library as in the other; but these gentlemen forget, he remarked, that the Federal Parliament possessed in 1867 a library of 60,000 volumes at least, and that since then it has not granted less than \$10,000 each year for the purchase of new books, while the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, which had not at that time one single volume, has not granted on an average more than \$4,000 per year.

Your committee requests once more that the sum of \$500 at least be expended each year on the purchase of works on Canadian History.

Your committee had conferred on the librarian by a resolution passed the 18th March, 1869, the privilege of franking letters, papers, books, &c., of his department; he prays that he may not be deprived of it.

By the permission of the Speakers of both Houses, the Librarian has removed the papers, journals and reviews, which he considers useful to preserve after they have been in the reading room for a reasonable time from that room into the library, notwithstanding this certain journals disappear previous to the time of taking possession.

Your committee recommends that the right of the library to these journals be confirmed by the Legislature, so that no person shall be ignorant of it.

 city of Montreal," reported that the committee had drawn up the following
 reasons :

1. Because this Bill is a Private Bill, specially relating to the citizens
 of Montreal, and that, at a public meeting, held and convened according to
 law, on the seventh May instant, section 7 of the said act, as adopted by
 the Legislative Assembly, was approved by the citizens of Montreal, as
 appears by the minutes hereunto annexed ; and that this opinion should
 be respected by the Legislature, unless very strong reasons be given
 against it.

2. Because the protection due to public health in the opinion expressed
 by the health committee and adopted by the City Council in 1879, only
 required the prohibiting of private abattoirs within the city limits, as appears
 in the said report hereunto annexed.

3. Because it is just to define the powers of the council of the said city and to prevent it from usurping the right from creating a monopoly in favor of the public abattoirs, to the detriment of citizens in general.

4. Because section 7 of the said act, as adopted by this House, maintains this prohibition and adds that of the previous inspection of the meat and adopts the three conditions claimed by the abattoir company, before the commencement of their operations and granted by the reports of the finance and market committees on the 26th April 1880, and adopted on the 10th May of the same year, appears by a copy of the same hereunto annexed : 1. Prohibiting private abattoirs within the city limits. 2. Inspection of the animals slaughtered at the abattoirs. 3. Inspection of meat from animals not slaughtered at the said abattoirs.

5. Because the amendments made by their Honors whilst maintaining unjust prohibition toward the butchers and traders would have the effect of protecting the farmers only if, the City Council wishes to have their meat inspected which it is at liberty to do or not.

6. Because in default of such inspection, the farmers meat cannot be sold by them, without subjecting them to the penalty provided in the said by law No. 129, that it to say the fine of forty dollars and in default of immediate payment to an imprisonment of two months.

7. Because such prohibitions are illegal and unjust restrictions upon the freedom of commerce, which this Legislature has no right to make and the putting in force of which it cannot give power to municipal corporations.

26th April, 1880.—Report presented from the Finance and Market Committees on the question of the public abattoirs. Next meeting.

1st May, 1880.—The Order of the Day being read to consider the report of the Finance and Market Committees on public abattoirs.

The following reports were read :

The joint Finance and Market Committees on Public abattoirs respectfully report : That they held several meetings and have conferred with Messrs. Hogan, Beaufort, Thomas Peel and others, parties interested in the establishment of public abattoirs, and, as the result of their labours, your committees have come to the conclusion that it is highly desirable, in the interests of the city and for the health and salubrity of its inhabitants that proper and suitable public abattoirs should be established, and that they be located outside the city, within three miles of its boundary.

That the abattoirs, which Messrs. Hogan and Beaufort propose to erect at Hochelaga, on the plot of ground referred to in their application hereunto annexed, and shown on the accompanying plan, are, in the opinion of your committee, suitable in all respects for the objects for which they are to be established.

Your committees therefore recommend that the said application of Messrs. Hogan and Beaufort, as notified by their letter of the 19th April instant, be favorably entertained.

Your committees further recommend that a by law be passed : 1. To prohibit the slaughtering of animals of any kind within the city limits, on, after the first day of May 1881, or as soon thereafter as public abattoirs, on a sufficiently large scale, to provide for the requirement of the city, shall have been built outside of the city limits, and are in good working order and ready to slaughter.

2. That no public abattoirs be allowed outside of the city limits, within three miles distance and except they are well drained, without interfering with the city sewers as in the case of Messrs. Hogan and Beaufort, and have a good supply of water and necessary rendering houses, &c., &c., to render all tallow and other refuse matter, and altogether in accordance with such rules and regulations, as the city council ; and the board of health

may, adopt in virtue of the powers conferred on them by the 34 subsection of section 123, of the city charter.

3. That no company or private individuals shall be allowed to kill any animals at the public abattoirs, unless the same shall have first been inspected by an inspector named by the corporation for that purpose, and shall have been declared by the said inspector to be in a fit state to make good and wholesome meat.

4. That no meat slaughtered, outside of the public abattoirs under the control of this corporation, be allowed to be sold for consumption within the city, unless it has first been inspected by the said inspector and a certificate obtained stating that the said meat is wholesome.

At a public meeting of the citizens of Montreal, held at St-James market, on the seventh May, 1882, officially convened by the Mayor and presided over by him.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted by the assembly.

Whereas, the Montreal city council adopted, on the 21st of November last a by-law concerning the following clause :

Sect. 9.—When the undermentioned conditions for the prohibition of private abattoirs or slaughter houses within the city of Montreal will have been fulfilled it is forbidden to sell for consumption in the said city, meat from any animal mentioned in the list annexed, which has been killed elsewhere than in the public abattoirs ; provided that nothing contained in this section can be interpreted as applying to pigs, brought from foreign parts during the winter, for sale in the said city, and as forbidding farmers from bringing to the markets of the said city and selling by the entire animal or in pieces meat of any sort of animal reared and killed by them selves.

Whereas by this arbitrary rule, a dangerous monopoly is created in favor of the public abattoirs and of foreign produce to the detriment of the citizens of Montreal, butchers, farmers and dealers in general ;

Whereas by virtue of this law, all the fresh meat necessary for the consumption of the citizens of Montreal, should come from public abattoirs with the exception of pigs coming from foreign parts and of meat of animals reared and killed by the farmers who offer it for sale ;

Whereas the application of this rule would be ruinous to the commerce of Montreal and has already raised the prices of fresh meat, to the detriment of poorer classes.

Whereas these prohibitive regulations should not be allowed in any city, with a view to monopoly, except when necessary to the public health ;

Whereas such regulations are not in force in any civilized town in the world ;

Whereas a good system of inspection of meat, such as obtained in the principal cities of the world, is sufficient for the protection of the public health ;

Whereas section 7 of Bill 110, actually submitted to the Quebec Legislature and entitled : “ An Act for amending the acts relative to the city of Montreal,” such as adopted by the Legislative Assembly, is of a nature to protect the public health in an efficacious manner, whilst destroying the monopoly created by the above mentioned by-law ;

Whereas section 7, such as adopted, protects the farmers, butchers, dealers and citizens in general ;

Whereas the abattoir companies have the right of protection from the city of Montreal such as promised them by the report of the Finance and Market committees. adopted April 26th, 1880, and it is solely on the faith of this report that these public undertakings have been made ;

Whereas this report only promises these companies three things : 1. prohibiting private abattoirs within the city limits ; 2. inspection of live animals for slaughter at the abattoirs ; 3. inspection of all meat not coming from the abattoirs ;

Whereas the seventh clause of the said act adopted maintains these agreements ;

Whereas the resolution passed by the Montreal City Council, on first instant, communicated to the Legislative Assembly of this province, does not represent the views of the city of Montreal,;

Be it resolved :

That His Honor the Mayor be prayed to defend this seventh clause before the Legislative Council, to press its adoption, and not to consent to its being thrown out.

And be it further resolved :

That the members of the Honorable Legislative Council of this province be informed that it would be but an act of justice to the citizens of Montreal, farmers and dealers of places near Montreal, to adopt this clause as it is actually submitted to them.

1. That the undersigned is informed that the eastern abattoir is insolvent, and that a considerable part of the necessary machinery has been removed, so that the butchers and traders of the eastern part of Montreal and the environs, will be obliged according to, the By Law No. 129 to go to the western abattoir to do their work.

2. Because the amendments made by the Honorable Legislative Council allowing this by law to continue in force for the butchers and traders will cause grave perplexity under the circumstances, which will only disappear by the adoption of section 7 as adopted by the Legislative Assembly.

The Honorable Mr. *Lacoste*, from the committee named to meet the managers of the Legislative Assembly respecting the Bill (No. 158) intituled: "An Act granting aid for the construction of certain railways," have the honor to report, that the committee met the managers of the Legislative Assembly this day at 11½ o'clock A. M., in the committee room No. 3 of the Legislative Council, who communicated the reasons in writing which they now submit to this honorable House.

They are as follows, to wit:

LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

Saturday, 27th May, 1882.

Reasons for which this House does not concur in the amendments made by the Legislative Council to Bill No. 158.

1. Because the rights and privileges of the holders of timber licenses are already sufficiently protected by the provisions of the Bill.
2. Because such amendments take away the whole value of the subsidies which the Legislature wishes to give to the Railway companies by depriving them of the lands along their line.
3. Because such amendments tend to deprive the government of the right to dispose in favor of the railway companies which the Legislature desires to assist with lands which belong to the Crown and the settlement of which by such companies, would be very desirable.
4. Because in as much as the timber licenses only affect the timber and not the land itself there is no reason to prevent such lands being granted for public utility.
5. Because such amendments have the affect of rendering the encouragement for the construction of such railways illusory and tends to destroy the object which this Bill has in view.

The Honorable Mr. *Lacoste*, from the same committee, submits besides the proceedings the following report :

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

27th May, 1882.

The managers appointed by this Honorable Council, relative to the Bill No. 158, have the honor to report :

That they met the managers appointed on the same Bill by the Honorable Legislative Assembly, and that the conference arrived at the following understanding :

The Council will not insist on the amendment which it made to section 2 of the Bill. The section 3, which has been struck out by the Council, will be inserted in the following terms :

The establishing of these alternate blocks shall not deprive the holders of limits, under licenses, of their rights acquired from the Government, and the holders thereof shall be entitled subject to all existing conditions, to the renewal of their licenses on such lands, until the railway companies have completed the construction of their roads, and until they have established on such lands so conceded *bona fide* settlers, who shall clear the same in the manner required by the regulations of the Crown Land department.

Section 7, shall accordingly be struck out, your managers recommend to the Honorable House that the Bill be amended in conformity with the present report and to send it, as amended by message to the honorable Legislative Assembly informing it that it does not insist on the amendment to clause 2.

"In Her Majesty's name, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor assents to these Bills."

Then the Honorable Speaker of the Legislative Assembly addressed

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, and presented for His Honor's acceptance a bill intituled :

An Act granting to Her Majesty the moneys required for the expenses of the government, for the financial years ending on the 30th June, 1882, and on the 30th June, 1883, and for other purposes connected with the public service.

To this Bill the royal assent was signified in the following words :

In Her Majesty's name, the Lieutenant Governor thanks her loyal subjects, accepts their benevolence and assents to this bill.

After which His Honor the Lieutenant Governor was pleased to close the first session of the fifth Parliament of the Province of Quebec with the following speech :

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly :

I have to congratulate you upon the results of your long labors during the present session.

This, the first session of the fifth Parliament of this Province, will be remembered as one of the most eventful of those held by the Legislature of Quebec ; and I am happy to state that it has been fruitful in measures which are of importance to the future welfare of the Province.

I notice with pleasure that in your appropriations, you have not overlooked the most deserving class of our population and that agriculture, together with the industries to which it gives rise, has received a large proportion of the supplies you have voted.

You have succeeded in restoring the equilibrium between receipts and expenditure, by securing a fixed revenue for the Province, through the sale of the railway which the Government had been authorized to build, and the imposing of a slight tax which will be borne only by those classes which have derived the most benefit from public improvements and are the best able to support the burden.

By this sale you have reduced the provincial debt, without in any way exposing the province to lose those advantages which it was entitled to expect from the working of this great railway.

You have crowned your work by converting the floating into a funded debt, thereby giving our population an opportunity of securing a safe and convenient investment.

These results are all the more fortunate that the province will be in a position to assist, more effectually, the growing industries which you have hitherto encouraged and induce capitalists to establish new enterprises in our country.

You have understood the requirements of the period, by devoting a portion of our immense territory, as yet undeveloped, to the building of new railways which will, in return, increase our resources tenfold and develop our colonization, agriculture and mines and foster our commerce.

I am happy to notice that, in making these generous grants, you have been careful to protect the greatest and most productive of our national industries, the lumber trade.

The autonomy of our province has received a new pledge of your protection in the measure you have passed, authorizing the Government of the province to intervene before the Courts in cases in which the constitutionality of Provincial or Federal acts is contested.

The capital will, owing to your liberality, soon have its Parliament and Court Houses, the building of which has so long been expected

The great works, necessitated by the steps you have taken, with respect to the complection of the line of the provincial railway and its junction with the Intercolonial, will inaugurate a new era for commerce, and supply our working classes with the means of securing comfort and prosperity for which they should be grateful.

By amending the constitution, as regards the composition of the Executive Council and the position of Speaker of the Legislative Council, you have complied with legitimate requirements, while in no wise increasing the burdens of the State.

The other measures which you have adopted for the improvement of our legislative, administrative and political systems, will be favorably appreciated by the population of this province.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

In Her Majesty's name I thank you for the supplies you have so generously voted, and I will not forget that you desire to see them employed with the wisest economy

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

In taking leave of you, I pray that Divine Providence will reward you and your families for your energetic and conscientious labours in the service of the State and your Sovereign.

Then the Honorable Speaker of the Legislative Council said :

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

Gentlemen of the House of Assembly.

It is His Honor the Lieutenant Governor's will and pleasure that this provincial legislature be prorogued until Tuesday, the 18th July next, to be here held and the provincial legislature is accordingly prorogued until Tuesday, the 18th of July, eighteen hundred and eighty-two.
