Thursday, 28th April 1881.

THURSDAY, the TWENTY EIGHTH day of the month of APRIL, in the forty fourth year of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, being the Fourth Session of the Fourth Parliament or Legislature of the Province of Quebec, as continued by several prorogations to this day.

At three o'clock in the afternoon, His Honor the Honorable Theodore Robitaille, Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Quebec, being seated in the Chair on the Throne, the Honorable the Speaker of this House commanded the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod to proceed to the Chamber of the Legislative Assembly and acquaint that House, « It is His Excellency's pleasure they attend him immediately in the Chamber of the Legislative Council. »

Who being come thereto.

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor was pleased to open the session by a gracious speech from the throne to both Houses :

Honorable Gentlemon of the Legislative Council :

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly :

I am happy to see you again assembled at the seat of Government, to attend to the interests of the Province, and I have no doubt that you return here animated with that spirit of cordiality and harmony, which characterised your legislative labors during the past session.

I notice, with pleasure, renewed activity in all branches of industry ; commerce is becoming more and more flourishing, our manufactories are increasing in numbers ; agriculture, owing chiefly to the generous encouragement which you have given to it, is now taking that place which it should occupy in developing the resources of the country.

In the great movement which is making of this Dominion a new nation, the Province of Quebec should perform its part which firmness, courage and ability.

Our progress is already very marked ; the Province has not only maintained the position which it held before Confederation, but it has also considerably improved it. The sphere of its operations has been largely extended, and we have every reason to hope for a future as brilliant as could be desired by the sincerest of patriots. A sentiment of generous devotion animates our population, and you have only to second their good impulse, in order to attain the end of the legitimate hopes of the country.

The *Credit Foncier*, to which you gave legal existence during last session, has commenced its good work, and its influence is already felt in the lowering of the rate of interest and the proportionate increase in the value of real estate.

The establishment of the beet-sugar industry has become an accomplished fact, in at least three counties. By means of this industry, so rich in itself, and susceptible of so large an increase, an important change will be effected in our system of agriculture.

The question of utilizing the rich deposits of phosphates in the Ottawa Valley, which seemed to have been abandoned, was again taken up by my Government and solved with a success which bids fair to surpass the results which were at first expected from it.

The working of our phosphates on a large scale, originated the idea of exporting it to foreign countries. This exportation, with that of live stock and agricultural produce, has given rise to the establishment of a line of Transatlantic Steamers which you will, I hope, before long, see performing a regular service between France and Canada, thanks to the generous assistance which, at our solicitation the Federal Government has been pleased to give to this important enterprise.

More unassuming, but of no less importance in its beneficial results, the manufacture of cheese and butter has been so largely increased in our province as to perceptibly alter the figures of our agricultural exports. The friends of agriculture will read with the greatest interest the reports to be submitted to you on this subject.

Colonization has continued to prosper during the past year. It is very satisfactory to me to be able to state that the repatriation of our fellow countrymen and the stream of immigration from abroad, afford a proof that our Province is becoming more and more advantageously known in foreign countries.

The exhibition held at Montreal was a brilliant and lasting success, and I have a great pleasure in informing you that some of the largest manufacturing establishments of the continent of Europe have expressed their intention of taking part in the next exhibition. My Government has deemed it its duty to extend them an invitation to that end.

The subsidies granted by the Legislature to Railway enterprises have had the effect of creating and completing a net-work of provincial roads which now gives us the most direct means of communication, not only with the various sections of our Province, but also with other Provinces and the great country on our borders.

The statement of the receipts from the Railway built by the Province, will be submitted to you. This statement is very satisfactory and will enable you to appreciate the steps to be taken by my Government for the future working of this great enterprise.

The legislation of last session respecting mines has already produced excellent results, which can but be continued.

You will notice by the report of the Commissioner of Crown Lands, that the receipts of his Department will, for the current year, greatly exceed those of past years. The sale of timber limits which has been held was the most important and profitable which has ever taken place in the Province.

The various Departments have been installed, during the present year, in the new Buildings, whose imposing grandeur is a solemn declaration of the permanency of our provincial institutions and of the importance attached by our population to the decided maintenance of our federal system.

Few measures of a public nature will be submitted to you this session. The legislation of last session was considerable and is, for the moment, adequate to the needs of the public service.

I am happy to be able to draw your attention to the simultaneous establishment of so many things, calculated to contribute to the general prosperity of our country, and it is a much more agreeable duty for me, to enumerate, as I have done, that which my government has endeavored to accomplish for the good of all, than to propose innovations in our laws.

You will, nevertheless, have to consider certain measures respecting the Administration of Justice, some amendments to the laws on Public Instruction and Agriculture as well as a measure for the better protection of workmen in the payment of their labor and wages.

The important work of Consolidating the Statutes has been commenced by a commission organized in accordance with the act of last session. The power granted to this Commission of altering the language and the order of the Statutes, and of suggesting amendments, allows it to draw up the laws in a regular and methodical form and thereby to give to such Consolidation a permanent and lasting character which it would be impossible to obtain by simply revising the Statutes. It is within the attributes of this Commission to search out subjects which are within the competence of Our Legislature. This study, under the circumstances, gives a more than usual importance to the work of the Commission.

A Bill will be presented to you to extend the duration of the parliament of the Province, and thus to decrease the frequency of elections and the expenditure occasioned thereby.

The large number of Private Bills to be submitted to you, is a proof of business prosperity and of the spirit of enterprise which reigns in our Province. Industry, Manufactures and Navigation and Railway Companies will, by this legislature, secure advantages which will be a source of gratification to all.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly ;

The Public Accounts of the past fiscal year, as well as a statement of the Receipts and Expenditure for the current year, will be submitted to you.

The estimates for the next fiscal year will also be placed before your House for approval. These estimates have been prepared with that regard to economy which is consistent with the efficiency of the public service.

The supplies necessary for the service of Her Majesty's government will be asked of you.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council ;

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly ;

I have no doubt that you will give to the consideration of these questions all the care which you have already displayed in the performance of your legislative duties.

I pray Divine Providence to bless your efforts and that success may crown your labors.

The Legislative Assembly then withdrew, His Honor the Lieutenant Governor was pleased to retire.

To the Honorable the Legislative Council of the Province of Quebec.

The Librarian of the Legislature of Quebec by this report on the state of the Library respectfully represents :

That your Library has been increased since the 28th May 1880 by 2,092 works of all kinds, making a total of 27,745.

Amongst the works received since the 28th May, there are 870 pamphlets which have been bound in volume like the previous ones and your Library now contains 217 volumes of Canadian pamphlets.

Your collection of newspapers public and other journals is of the finest and includes 1250 volumes.

Several large series are complete amongst others those of *La Minerve*, *Le Journal de Québec*, *The Mercury*, *The Montreal Herald*, *L'Événement*, *Le Franc-Parleur*, *The Leader*, *The Canadian Illustrated News* and *L'Opinion Publique*.

A good number of others of less importance are also complete.

Nearly eight hundred persons are permitted to take books from your Library ; nevertheless the service is well performed, thanks to the zeal and punctuality of the two subordinate officers.

I am happy to see the Library so visited because it only contains books the reading of which cannot but be beneficial for all.

The sphere of our exchanges with other countries is continually becoming enlarged and quite recently I received from the government of Brazil a considerable invoice.

I will collect the greatest possible number of Canadian works and will offer them, in return, in the name of the Legislature of Quebec.

That an humble address be presented to His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, thanking him for his gracious speech at the opening of the fourth session of the fourth Parliament of the Province of Quebec, and for the pleasure manifested by him at seeing us again assembled at the seat of Government to attend to the interests of the Province, and further to assure His Honor.

1. That we return to the seat of Government animated with that spirit of cordiality and harmony, which characterised our legislative labors during the past session ;

2. That it is with pleasure that we notice renewed activity in all branches of industry ; that commerce becomes more and more flourishing and our manufactories increasing in numbers, and that agriculture is now taking that place which it should occupy in developing the resources of the country ;

3. That we admit that in the great movement which is making of this Dominion a new nation, the Province of Quebec should perform its part with firmness, courage and ability ;

4. That we notice our progress with satisfaction, for the Province has not only maintained the position which it held before Confederation, but has also considerably improved it. The sphere of its operations have been largely extended and we have every reason to hope for a future as brilliant as could be desired by the sincerest of patriots. A sentiment of generous devotion animates our popula-

tion, and we have no doubt that we have only to second their good impulse, in order to attain the end of the legitimate hopes of the country.

That we are happy to learn :

5. That the Credit Foncier, to which we gave legal existence during last session, has commenced its good work, and we are aware that its influence is already felt, in the lowering of the rate of interest and the proportionate increase in the value of real estate ;

6. That the establishment of the beet-sugar industry has become an accomplished fact, in at least three counties. By means of this industry, so rich in itself, and susceptible of so large an increase, an important change will certainly be effected in our system of agriculture ;

7. That the question of utilizing the rich deposits of phosphate in the Ottawa Valley, which seemed to have been abandoned, was again taken up by the Government, and solved with a success which bids fair to surpass the results which were at first expected from it ;

8. That the working of our phosphates on a large scale, originated the idea of exporting it to foreign countries : that this exportation, with that of live stock and agricultural produce, has given rise to the establishment of a line of Transatlantic Steamers, and we hope, before long to see it performing a regular service between France and Canada, thanks to the generous assistance which, at the solicitation of the Government of this Province, the Federal Government has been pleased to give to this important enterprise ;

9. That the manufacture of cheese and butter has been so largely increased in our province as to perceptibly alter the figures of our agricultural exports and that the friends of agriculture will read with the greatest interest the reports to be submitted on this subject :

10. That colonization has continued to prosper during the past year and that, we are much pleased to find that the repatriation of our fellow-countrymen and the stream of immigration from abroad, afford a proof that our Province is becoming more and more advantageously known in foreign countries ;

11. That the Exhibition held at Montreal was a brilliant and lasting success, and that some of the largest manufacturing establishments of the continent of Europe have expressed their intention of taking part in the next exhibition and that the Government has deemed it its duty to extend them an invitation to that end ;

12. That the subsidies granted by the Legislature to railway enterprises have had the effect of creating and completing a net-work of provincial roads which now gives us the most direct means of communication, not only with the various sections of our Province, but also with other Provinces and the great country on our borders ;

13. That the statement of the receipts from the Railway built by the Province to be submitted to us, is very satisfactory, and will enable us to appreciate the steps to be taken by the Government for the future working of this great enterprise.

14. That the legislation of last session respecting mines has already produced excellent results, which can but be continued.

15. That we will notice with pleasure from the report of the Commissioner of Crown Lands, that the receipts of his department will, for the current year, greatly exceed those of past years, and that the sale of timber limits, which has been held, was the most important and profitable which has ever taken place in the Province

That we are pleased to learn :

16. That the various Departments have been installed, during the present year, in the new Buildings, whose imposing grandeur is a solemn declaration of

the permanency of our provincial institutions and of the importance attached by our population to the decided maintenance of our federal system ;

17. That the legislation of last session is adequate to the needs of the public service and that consequently there will be few measures of a public nature, submitted to us, this session.

18. That we are pleased to find the simultaneous establishment of so many things, calculated to contribute to the general prosperity of our country, and it must be a more agreeable duty for His Honor to enumerate, as he has done, that which the government has endeavored to accomplish for the good of all, than to propose innovations in our laws ;

19. That we will attentively examine the measures respecting the Administration of Justice, and the amendments to the laws of Public Instruction and Agriculture, together with the measure for the better protection of workmen in the payment of their labour and wages, to be submitted to us ;

20. That we learn with pleasure from His Honor that the important work of Consolidating the Statutes has been commenced by a commission organized in accordance with the act of last session ; that the power granted to this Commission of altering the language and the order of the Statutes, and of suggesting amendments, will allow it to draw up the laws in a regular and methodical form and thereby to give such Consolidation a permanent and lasting character which would be impossible to attain by a simple revision of the Statutes ; that it is within the attributes of this Commission to pass in review subjects which are within the competency of our Legislature, and that this study, under the circumstances, will give a more than usual importance to the work of the Commission ;

21. That the Bill to be presented to us to extend the duration of the parliaments of the Province and thus to decrease the frequency of elections and the expenditure occasioned thereby, will have our serious attention ;

22. That, with His Honor, we see with pleasure in the large number of Private Bills to be submitted to us, a proof of business prosperity and of the spirit of enterprise which reigns in our Province ; that Industry, Manufactures, and Navigation and Railway Companies will, by this legislation, secure advantages which will be a source of gratification to all ;

23. That we will give to the consideration of the questions submitted to us all the care which we have already displayed in the performance of our legislative duties ;

24. That we, with His Honor, pray Divine Providence to bless our efforts and to crown our labors with success.

And after debate, at six o'clock,

The Honorable Mr. *Speaker* left the chair.

At half past seven o'clock, the House was resumed.

The first paragraph being again read,

The Honorable Mr. *Beaudry*, seconded by the Honorable Mr. *Webb*, moved,

That the same be adopted.

The question of concurrence being put thereon, the same was unanimously Resolved in the affirmative.

The 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th, 11th, 12th, 13th, 14th, 15th, 16th, 17th, 18th, 19th, 20th, 21st, 22nd, 23rd and 24th paragraphs of the said resolutions being severally read and the question of concurrence being put on each, they were unanimously agreed to.

The question of concurrence being put on the adoption of the said resolutions it was unanimously

Resolved in the affirmative.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. *Ross*, seconded by the Honorable Mr. *de Boucherville*, it was

Ordered, That the Honorable Messrs. *Webb*, *Ferrier*, *de LaBruère*, the mover and the seconder, be appointed a committee to draft an address founded on the foregoing resolutions.

2. Because the second reading of the said Bill was not regular and in conformity with the rules aforesaid, the said second reading could not be regular, until after the committee of Standing Orders and Private Bills had reported as to the sufficiency of the petition and on the notices, which was not done in conformity with the said rules and particularly of the rule No. 51 ;

3. Because no report was ever made by the said committee on the said Bill after its first reading as required by the rule (No. 52) ;

4. Because therefore the said committee was never regularly put in possession or legally seized of the said Bill (No. 15) and could not therefore make a valid report ;

5. Because the rules of this Honorable House establishing the delay after which the said petition could not be either presented or received were never dispensed with or abrogated in relation to this Bill (No. 15) ;

6. Because there was not, within reasonable time, a report of the said committee, nor resolutions of this Honorable House, dispensing as to this Bill (No. 15) of a petition or regular notice presented and published as required by law, and the said rules.

7. Because no notice such as required by law and the rules of this House especially and particularly by the rule No. 49 were never published in the district of Montreal, to which district the measure more specially applies ;

8. Because the notices alluded to and referred to, do not clearly and distinctly declare the nature and object of the application to be made.

9. Because there are essential divergencies between the notices and the said Bill.

10. Because the said committee refused to hear the parties interested on the merits of a number of objections of an essential character to the passing of the said Bill before deciding formally on the committing a denial of justice.

That the report of the Committee on the Bill No. 15, respecting the Laval University and the multiplication of its Professors chairs in the faculty of arts and other faculties, within the limits of the Province of Quebec, be not now received, but whereas a petition has been presented to Her Majesty from

the Roman Catholic Archbishop and Bishop of the Province of Quebec, dated the 4th November, 1880, praying that the rights and privileges of this University be defined in virtue of the royal charter of the 8th December, 1852, and an answer to this petition, the Secretary of State acquainted the Governor General of Canada, that it did not appear to him suitable to invite Her Majesty to intervene when the question of the powers of the Laval University was about to be submitted to the decision of a civil tribunal, and whereas since this answer was given the question of the powers of the Laval University, has in fact been submitted to the civil tribunals of this Province, whereas the case before the civil tribunals is still pending and that the advisers of Her Majesty are waiting till it is adjudged upon, to advise Her Majesty to act upon the said petition of the Archbishop and Bishops of this Province.

That it be therefore resolved that this House does not think it proper to adopt this Bill presently, and that the report of the committee be read this day three months.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

PROTEST.

The undersigned hereby protests against the passing of the Bill No. 15. intitled : « An Act concerning the Laval University and the multiplication of its Professor's chairs of arts and other faculties within the limits of the Province of Québec, » for among others the following reasons :

1. Because the said Bill is unconstitutional.

2. Because the legislature of the Province of Quebec, has no constitutional right to amend, extend or interpret a royal charter, giving the right to confer degrees, and honorary University titles.

3. Because this Bill commits a flagrant injustice, to the injury of the city of Montreal and of all the region or country of which she is the centre.

4. Because this Bill is not the expression of the free opinion of the majority of the electors of this Province, neither is it that of the majority of the members of this Honorable House, nor that of the members of the Legislative Assembly.

5. Because proof was made before this honorable House, as well by hundreds of petitions presented to this Legislature, as by resolutions passed unanimously at numerous public meetings, that the very large majority of parties interested in the passing of this Bill, that is to say the very large majority of the population of the districts to which this Bill applies, and which will be directly subject to the operation of this law, and resolutely opposed to the passing of this Bill.

6. Because the said Bill was not regularly placed before this Legislature, and more particularly before this honorable Council, it having been introduced without being preceded by a petition, and after the time fixed as well by the regulations as by the resolutions of this honorable House for the introduction of Private Bills.

7. Because the said Bill has passed through several stages to which the law and the said rules subjected it in a most irregular manner, contrary to the law and to the said rules, and this notwithstanding the energetic protestations of several members of this honorable Council.

8. Because the said Bill was read a second time, before any regular petitions had prayed for its passing, had been presented to this Honorable House, received by it and read, without there having been previously a report on the said Bill from the Committee on Standing Orders and Private Bills, establishing that the formalities essential to the passing of such a Bill, maintaining the presentation and reception of a petition, the publication of sufficient notice, &c., &c., had been fulfilled ;

9. Because the said Bill was considered by the Committee on Private Bills, irregularly and without any notice of the meeting of the Committee having been affixed in the lobby conformably to the rule 58, and without the twenty four hours notice conformably to the same rule.

10. Because the said Bill was never regularly referred to the Committee on Standing Orders and Private Bills before its second reading.

11. That the said committee was never regularly put in possession of the said Bill. That in consequence it never could make a regular examination in conformity with the law and with the rules of this House, and that in consequence the said committee could never make and has never made a regular report on the said Bill. After a second reading and before the third reading, that the pretended report made, is irregular, illegal, null and of no effect, contrary to the rules of this House, and especially to the rules 51, 52, 53 and 54.

12. Because the said Bill was passed by the Legislative Assembly in direct violation of the rules of the Legislative Assembly. That it was passed by this Honorable Council in direct violation of the rules of the said Council and contrary to the said rules, and without any proceeding taken or resolution adopted to suspend the operation of the said rules of the Legislative Assembly or of the Legislative Council ; and that, notwithstanding the protest of many honorable members of the said Legislative Council and of the Legislative Assembly.

13. Because the notice required by-law and by the rules of this honorable house, as well as by those of the Legislative Assembly were not given nor published, according to law and the said rules, and more particularly because the said notices were not published in any news paper of the city or district of Montreal, nor in any of the news papers in any of the districts to which the

measure prayed for applies, namely : the said Bill as required by the 49th Rule of the said honorable Council

14. Because the vote on the merits of the said Bill, and on several propositions and motions affecting the merits of said Bill was taken, as well in the committee on Private Bills in the Legislative Assembly, as in the committee on Standing Orders and Private Bills in the Legislative Council with closed doors, and that, without any order or direction to that effect having been given either by the Legislative Assembly or the Legislative Council.

15. Because the Committee on Private Bills of the Honorable Legislative Council, refused to hear the parties interested on the constitutional merits of the said Bill, and on the insufficiency, irregularity and absence of proceedings and formalities essential to the passing of the said Bill, more especially that the said Committee refused to hear the interested parties on the question of the insufficiency of the notices, the absence of a petition at the time of the second reading, the inobservance of the rules, the absence of any report of the Committee on Standing Orders, and Private Bills before the second reading, before pronouncing and voting finally on the merits of said questions.

16. Because the said Committee restrained unjustly and arbitrarily the interested parties and their lawyers, advocates and counsel, in the statement of the legitimate means they had in support of their opposition to this Bill, conformably to law and the rules of this House, by limiting the time evidently too short for the proper delivery of their arguments.

17. Because by its manner of proceeding, the said committee on Standing Orders and private Bills committed to the prejudice of the parties interested a denial of justice.

18. Because the adoption of this Bill is contrary to law and justice.

In dispensing at present with the further continuation of your Parliamentary labors, I wish to thank you for the diligence which you have shown in the execution of your public duties.

The measures, which I submitted to your consideration, were important, and required a great amount of work on your part.

You have fulfilled your task with a devotion which deserves public acknowledgment, and I am confident that the country will have only to rejoice at the result of your deliberations.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly ;

In the name of Her Majesty, I thank you for the supplies that you have generously voted for the various branches of the public service.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council ;

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly ;

As you are about to separate to return to your homes, I sincerely wish you all happiness, and pray to God to grant his protection to your families, and to all the inhabitants of our faithful and loyal Province.

Then the Honorable the Speaker of the Legislative Council said :

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council ;

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly ;

It is His Honor the Lieutenant Governor's will and pleasure that this provincial legislature be prorogued until Thursday, the eighteenth day August next, to be here held, and the provincial legislature is accordingly prorogued until Thursday, the eighteenth day of August.
