

Thursday, 3rd November 1870.

THURSDAY, the THIRD day of the month of NOVEMBER, in the Thirty-Fourth year of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lady Victoria by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen Defender of the Faith, being the Fourth Session of the First Provincial Parliament of Quebec, as continued by several prorogations to this day.

His Excellency Sir Narcisse Fortunat Belleau, Knight, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Quebec, being seated in the chair on the throne, the Honorable the Speaker commanded the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, to proceed to the Chamber of the Legislative Assembly, and acquaint that House. "It is His Excellency's pleasure that they attend him immediately in the Chamber of the Legislative Council."

Who being come, His Excellency was pleased to open the Session by a gracious speech to both Houses.

*Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,
Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,*

On the occasion of your first meeting at the opening of the first session of the present Parliament, I thought it my duty to explain to you the extent and importance of the subjects which the new constitution submitted to our legislation and your control; you have since devoted yourselves with diligence to these various matters, you have laid the foundation of the political organization of this Province, and I am happy now to recognise the satisfactory results which our legislation has produced.

There is, however, an important matter which has been the subject of your labours and deliberations, and upon which you have not finally pronounced; the assiduous care which you have afforded to the preparation of the Municipal Code and the publicity which you have given to the project which you have prepared gives me reason to hope that you will be able, during the present session, to terminate this useful work with every assurance that can be desired for its future success and stability.

During the three sessions of this Parliament liberal appropriations have been made for Education, for Charitable Institutions, for Public Works, for Colonization and Immigration, and also to aid those companies whose object it was to develop the resources of the Province by the construction of new railways, and the results which have thus been obtained are such as to encourage you to persevere in the same course, taking care to keep within the financial resources of the Province.

The extensive explorations which had been commenced have been pressed forward with vigour and will shortly enable large tracts of territory to be opened for the timber trade and for settlement.

Measures have been taken to stimulate Immigration and also to encourage the return of our fellow-countrymen who had established themselves in the United States, satisfactory progress has already been made, and we may fairly expect greater results in the future.

The commission charged with the inquiry into the organization of the Civil Service has terminated its labours and its second report will be submitted to you.

The arbitrator who was named by this Province in virtue of the British North America Act, for the division of the debts and assets of the late Province of Canada, a gentleman of distinguished talent and enjoying a high reputation for legal knowledge and integrity, finding that there existed between the other arbitrators and himself an irreconcilable difference of opinion, resigned his office. The arbitrators named by the Province of Ontario and by the Government of Canada continued their deliberations without this Province being in any way represented, and I have thought it my duty to protest first against the illegality of their proceedings and afterwards against the manifestly illegal and unjust result at which they arrived. The correspondence which has taken place on this subject will be submitted to your consideration.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

The Public Accounts will be submitted to you and I am happy to be able to inform you that notwithstanding the heavy expenses which have been incurred in the public works, the balance in the hands of the Treasurer on the first of July last, was larger than at the corresponding period last year.

Several portions of this Province having been visited by extensive conflagrations; the Government came to the assistance of the victims of these misfortunes. Accounts will be laid before you of the monies which have been expended as a matter of urgency for these purposes.

The ordinary votes will be asked from you, for the different branches of the public service.

*Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,
Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,*

I do not doubt that in this fourth session of your Parliament, by the wisdom of your deliberations, by the good understanding which has always existed amongst you, you will be able, with the assistance of Divine Providence to establish on a firm basis, the prosperity of this Province.

The Legislative Assembly then withdrew.
His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor was pleased to retire.

The Honorable Mr. *Beaubien* presented to the House a Bill (A) intituled :
“ An Act relating to Agriculture.”

The Speaker reported His Excellency's Speech from the throne, and the same was then read by the clerk.

Ordered, that all the Legislative Councillors present during this session be appointed a committee to consider of the orders and customs of this House and privileges of Parliament, and that the said committee have leave to meet in this House when and as often as they please.

The Speaker presented to the House the Librarian's Report, which is as follows :

To the Honorable the Legislative Council,

The Custodian of the Library of the Legislature of Quebec, by this his fourth annual Report, upon the state of the Library, humbly represents,

That the most careful attention has been given as in past years to the important Department entrusted to his charge ;

That the loss or damage to books which often occurs in public Libraries has been strictly guarded against, and I am happy to state that there are no books missing or damaged in our Library ;

That a large number of works the want of which has been very much felt, has been purchased during the past year, and every care was taken in their selection ;

That particular attention was given in the selection of works on law, political economy, and sciences and useful arts ;

That the grant voted for the expenses of this Department was not quite sufficient owing to the great number of expensive works purchased, and which are deemed necessary to form a nucleus of a Library ;

That the number of volumes in the Library has increased during one year to nearly 1,400, which makes a grand total exclusive of the journals and sessional documents of over 7,000 volumes.

That they have examined the various contracts entered into in respect of the printing of the Legislature, with A. Côté, Esq., J. J. Foote, Esq., and Messrs. L. N. and L. D. Duvernay; they beg to express their entire satisfaction with these contracts and to recommend that the Clerk of your Committee attend carefully to their due execution.

Your sub-committee specially recommend that the 56th Rule of the Honorable the Legislative Council and the 58th Rule of the Legislative Assembly in so far as they relate to the printing of Private Bills by the printing contractors of the two Houses be strictly adhered to; that A. Côté, Esq., print the French version and J. J. Foote, Esq., the English version of the Bills and that all Bills be printed in *small pica* type.

The Order of the Day was read for the consideration of the Message from the Legislative Assembly relative to an address to His Excellency the Governor General concerning the arbitration.

The Honorable Mr. *Archaubeault* moved that it be resolved :

1. That according to the provisions of the one hundred and forty second section of the British North America Act, 1867, the division and adjustment of the debts, credits, liabilities, properties and assets of Upper and Lower Canada should have been referred to the arbitrament of three Arbitrators, one chosen by the Government of Ontario, one by the Government of Quebec, and the third by the Government of Canada, the last mentioned not to be a resident, either in Ontario or in Quebec.

2. That the Honorable Charles Dewey Day, having been appointed Arbitrator by the Province of Quebec, the Honorable David Lewis Macpherson by the Province of Ontario, and the Honorable John Hamilton Gray by the Government of Canada, and the last named Arbitrator having taken up his residence in Ottawa, the Government of the Province of Quebec have deemed it incumbent upon them to protest against his continuing in office, and to express both to the Government of Canada and to the Arbitrators themselves, their firm conviction, that to carry out the true intent and meaning of the British North America Act, the decision of the Arbitrators should be unanimous.

3. That subsequently, on the ninth day of July last, the Honorable Charles Dewey Day, the Arbitrator appointed by the Province of Quebec, differing in opinion with the others Arbitrators respecting a preliminary judgment, which appeared to him based upon pretensions at once unfounded in fact and in law, and deeming that by the rendering of that judgment the examination of the question would be restricted by the inflexible rule of an erroneous judgment, and that it would be therefore, impossible to arrive at any equitable and satisfactory conclusion, felt it to be his duty to resign his office.

4. That such resignation having been accepted by the Government of the Province of Quebec, notice thereof was immediately given, to wit: on the eleventh day of July last, to the Government of Canada, and to Messrs. Gray and Macpherson; the Government of the Province of Quebec, at the same time, protesting against any ulterior action on the part of the Arbitration Commission, which was thus rendered incomplete.

5. That notwithstanding the representations so made to them, Messrs. Gray and Macpherson entered upon the examination of the questions submitted by the two Provinces, without the Province of Quebec being in any way represented and on the third day of September last rendered a pretended award, against which His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Quebec, by despatch dated the thirteenth day of September last, and addressed to His Excellency the Governor-General, protested as unjust and illegal.

6. That the injustice of the said pretended award is evident from the same having been rendered wholly in the interest of the Province of Ontario, and from the fact that while Messrs. Gray and Macpherson refused to take into consideration the relative financial positions of the two Provinces at the time of the Union, they have taken into consideration the object and nature of certain items of expenditure as having been incurred in one or the other section of the Province of Canada from the period of the Union to Confederation; that the said pretended award is further unjust in as much as the division of the credits, properties and assets of the late Province of Canada does not even proceed upon the same basis and principles as those which appear to have been adopted in relation to the division of the balance of the debt, and does not rest upon any principle whatsoever, but is purely arbitrary and favors the Province of Ontario, at the expense of the Province of Quebec; that, lastly, the provisions of the said pretended award fully justify the apprehensions of the distinguished lawyer selected by this Province as its Arbitrator, and the firm and independent line of conduct which be adopted in the interests of justice.

7. That the said pretended award is absolutely illegal, null and void, for the reasons hereinbefore set forth, and also as having been rendered by two Arbitrators, who, by the resignation of their colleague, remained without any power or jurisdiction, and that, therefore, the intentions of the British North America Act have not been carried out, and no valid title has been conferred upon either Province in relation to the credits, properties and assets which it was the duty of the said Arbitrators to apportion and divide between the two Provinces.

8. That, the Province of Quebec can neither submit to its property being disposed of or to any sum whatever being exacted from it, nor can it accept any property, credits or assets, in virtue of the said pretended award, and that it is bound to resist and shall resist by all the means within its power, the execution of the said pretended award; claiming as it does that justice be done and that its rights, as recognized by the British North America Act, be maintained.

9. That an Humble Address, based upon the foregoing resolutions, be presented to His Excellency the Governor-General, praying His Excellency to adopt such measures, as are best calculated to insure justice to this Province.

The first paragraph being again read.

The Honorable Mr. *Archambeault*, moved

That it be received and

The question of concurrence being put on the said motion, it was *Resolved* in the affirmative.

The 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th and 9th paragraphs being again read and the question of concurrence being put on each separately, they were unanimously.

Resolved in the affirmative.

To His Excellency the Right Honorable JOHN, BARON LISGAR, of Lisgar and Baillieborough, in the County of Cavan, Ireland; in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland one of Her Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, Knight Grand Cross of the most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, Knight Grand Cross of the most distinguished Order of St. Michael and Saint George, Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada, and Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Island of Prince Edward, &c., &c., &c.

May it please Your Excellency :

We, Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Council of the Province of Quebec, in Provincial Legislature assembled humbly approach Your Excellency for the purpose of representing.

That according to the provisions of the one hundred and forty-second section of the British North America Act, 1867, the division and adjustment of the debts, credits, liabilities, properties and assets of Upper and Lower Canada should have been referred to the arbitrament of three Arbitrators, one chosen by the Government of Ontario, one by the Government of Quebec, and the third by the Government of Canada, the last mentioned not to be a resident, either in Ontario or in Québec.

That the Honorable Charles Dewey Day, having been appointed Arbitrator by the Province of Quebec, the Honorable David Lewis Macpherson by the Province of Ontario, and the Honorable John Hamilton Gray by the Government of Canada, and the last named Arbitrator having taken up his residence in Ottawa, the Government of the Province of Quebec have deemed it incumbent upon them to protest against his continuing in office, and to express both to the Government of Canada and to the Arbitrators themselves, their firm conviction, that to carry out the true intent and meaning of the British North America Act, the decision of the Arbitrators should be unanimous.

That subsequently, on the ninth day of July last, the Honorable Charles Dewey Day, the Arbitrator appointed by the Province of Quebec, differing in opinion with the other Arbitrators respecting a preliminary judgment, which appeared to him based upon pretensions at once unfounded in fact and in law, and deeming that by the rendering of that judgment the examination of the question would be restricted by the inflexible rule of an erroneous judgment, and that it would be therefore, impossible to arrive at any equitable and satisfactory conclusion, felt it to be his duty to resign his office.

That such resignation having been accepted by the Government of the Province of Quebec, notice thereof was immediately given, to wit : on the eleventh day of July last, to the Government of Canada, and to Messrs Gray and Macpherson ; the Government of the Province of Quebec, at the same time, protesting against any ulterior action on the part of the Arbitration Commission, which was thus rendered incomplete.

That notwithstanding the representations so made to them, Messrs.

Gray and Macpherson entered upon the examination of the questions submitted by the two Provinces, without the Province of Quebec being in any way represented, and on the third day of September last, rendered a pretended award, against which His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Quebec, by despatch dated the thirteenth day of September last, and addressed to His Excellency the Governor-General, protested as unjust and illegal.

That the injustice of the said pretended award is evident from the same having been rendered wholly in the interest of the Province of Ontario, and from the fact that while Messrs. Gray and Macpherson refused to take into consideration the relative financial positions of the two Provinces at the Union, they have taken into consideration the object and nature of certain items of expenditure as having been incurred in one or the other section of the Province of Canada from the period of the Union to Confederation; that the said pretended award is further unjust, in as much as the division of the credits, properties and assets of the late Province of Canada does not even proceed upon the same basis and principles as those which appear to have been adopted in relation to the division of the balance of the debt, and does not rest upon any principle whatsoever, but is purely arbitrary and favors the Province of Ontario, at the expense of the Province of Quebec; that, lastly, the provisions of the said pretended award fully justify the apprehensions of the distinguished lawyer selected by this Province as its Arbitrator, and the firm and independent line of conduct which be adopted in the interests of justice.

That the said pretended award is absolutely illegal, null and void, for the reasons hereinbefore set forth, and also as having been rendered by two Arbitrators, who, by the resignation of their colleague, remained without any power or jurisdiction, and that, therefore, the intentions of the British North America Act have not been carried out, and no valid title has been conferred upon either Province in relation to the credits, properties and assets which it was the duty of the said Arbitrators to apportion and divide between the two Provinces.

That, the Province of Quebec can neither submit to its property being disposed of, or to any sum whatever being exacted from it, nor can it accept any property, credits or assets, in virtue of the said pretended award, and that it is bound to resist and shall resist by all the means within its power, the execution of the said pretended award; claiming as it does that justice be done and that its rights, as recognized by the British North America Act, be maintained.

Wherefore we humbly pray that Your Excellency will be pleased to adopt such measures as are best calculated to insure justice to this Province.

The said address was read by the Clerk and unanimously adopted.

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, and presented for His Excellency's acceptance a Bill intituled :

An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required for defraying certain expenses of the Civil Government for the financial year ending on the thirtieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two, and for other purposes connected with the public service.

To this Bill the Royal assent was signified in the following words :

" In Her Majesty's name, the Lieutenant-Governor thanks Her Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, accepts their benevolence and assents to this Bill."

After which His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor was pleased to close the Fourth Session of the First Parliament of the Province of Quebec with the following Gracious Speech :

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

I congratulate you in the name of Our Gracious Sovereign, on the important tasks which you have accomplished during the present Session.

To the measures sanctioned in previous Sessions, you have added liberal grants in favor of iron and wooden railways, which, by binding more closely together the various parts of our own Province and uniting us to the neighbouring Provinces, will, I am confident, develop our commerce, attract foreign emigration, and facilitate the settlement of the public domain by the youth of the country.

Our position in the centre of the Confederation and on the shores of the river and gulf of St. Lawrence, ensures us a distinguished part in the future of this continent, and the disposition which the people of this Province evince to call into vigorous action all our commercial, industrial and agricultural resources, appears to me to afford a certain guarantee for our prosperity in time to come, in despite of the numerous obstacles with which we have now to contend.

I have had much pleasure in sanctioning the Municipal Code, and I trust with confidence that our rural population will not be slow to avail themselves of the opportunities which it will hold out to them for local improvements and the maintenance of public order and good morals.

I return you thanks for the attention which you have bestowed upon the Bills submitted to you respecting civil procedure, public instruction, agriculture and that portion of the internal revenue which is left to your disposal, as also for your careful examination of the correspondence laid before you, relative to the arbitration ordered by the British North America Act, and I entertain no doubt that the country will sustain you in the determination which you have unanimously expressed to obtain justice for the Province.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

I thank you for the liberality with which you have voted the supplies.

Honorable Gentlemen and Gentlemen,

This session being the fourth of the first Parliament, the term of which ends in the course of next summer, I sincerely pray, that at the ensuing

elections, the same spirit of harmony and moderation may be everywhere apparent, which, taking into consideration the inevitable differences of opinion under a constitutional government, has never failed to mark your deliberations.

I beg of you to accept my warmest good wishes for your own welfare and for that of your families.

The Honorable the Speaker of this House then said :

Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly,

“It is His Excellency’s will and pleasure that this Provincial Parliament be prorogued until Tuesday, the twenty-first day of February next, to be here holden, and the Provincial Parliament is accordingly prorogued until Tuesday, the twenty-first day of February next.”
